



Conjunctions

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Simply put, conjunctions connect words, phrases, and clauses. For example: In the sentence “Did you buy the black shirt or the green one?”, the word “or” connects the phrases “the black shirt” and “the green one”. So, “or” is a conjunction.

·Coordinating conjunctions connect words to words, phrases to phrases, or independent clauses (main ideas) to independent clauses (for example: and, or, but, so, etc.).

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·Subordinating conjunctions connect the independent clause (the main idea) to the dependent idea (for example: because, since, if, unless, etc.).

·Correlative conjunctions are conjunctions that work in pairs (for example: either...or, neither...nor, both...and, whether...or, etc.).

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
